

The Opening Night Awards Ceremony at Listowel Writers' Week will see the presentation of some of the most prestigious awards and prizes in Irish writing, including the Kerry Group Irish Novel of the Year Award, which carries a €20,000 prize for the winner, the Pigott Poetry Prize, which carries a €12,000 prize for the winner.

The John B. Keane Lifetime Achievement Award will be presented to Stephen Rea in recognition of his work in theatre and film, with a particular emphasis on his work with Field Day Theatre Company.

Other prizes announced on the night include the Bryan MacMahon Short Story Award, The Collection of Poetry Award, Creative Writing for Adults with a Learning Difficulty/Disability, Duais Foras na Gaeilge, Nilsson Local Heritage Award and the Writing in Prisons Award.

Music will be provided by the acclaimed singer-songwriter Jack O'Rourke, who wrote Opera on the Top Floor about Listowel native Michael O'Connor.


Opening Night is a chance to don your glad rags and begin the festival with some glitter and sparkle.

Michael O'Connor was a collector. At some point he sent a letter to a film production company asking if they would send him a poster for their latest film. When they did, it started a collection of graphic art that is now of major international significance.

In 1989, he donated almost 3000 original posters from various cultural institutions to the Limerick City Gallery of Art. They have become a permanent collection.

For the first time, you can see a selection of the posters he decided to keep. These rare and beautiful pieces of graphic art offer an oblique glimpse of the life of a fine artist in his own right who lived in the heart of Listowel.


Seán Hewitt's debut memoir *All Down Darkness Wide* is an unflinching meditation on the burden of living in a world that too often sets happiness and queer life at odds, and a tender portrayal of what it's like to be caught in the undertow of a loved one's suffering. By turns devastating and soaring, it is a mesmerising story of heartache and renewal, and a work of rare and transcendent beauty.

The Observer described *All Down*Darkness Wide as 'a remarkable memoir of love and sorrow.'



Alice Kinsella's first book of non-fiction *Milk: On Motherhood and Madness* is set against the backdrop of a seemingly changed Ireland and in it she draws for us her own map of motherhood, a crucial reflection spanning nine months of pregnancy and the first nine months of her child's life. Intimate, warm, startlingly vivid and gentle, this is at once a delicate reflection on a moment of gigantic change in body and mind and a powerful, often painful confrontation of the politics of a country so deeply unsure about its women.

Joseph O'Connor described *Milk* as 'a radiant, meditative, truly powerful and beautiful book.'



FERGUS CRONIN & NITHY KASA
IN ASSOCIATION WITH DOIRE PRESS

Night Music is the highly-anticipated debut short story collection from Fergus Cronin. In the wilds of Connemara, a lone cowboy exacts a terrible revenue: an abused brother and sister settle scores with their 'ol' unkie'; a grieving man steers his river-craft towards a shocking reckoning. In these tense, by turns troubling and uplifting stories, Fergus Cronin reveals the savagery, the tenderness and the humour that is at the heart of human nature. Richard Ford said that it is 'a stirring, artful and ultimately beautiful suite of stories. Cronin has an instinct for the dire in lived life, and uses the story form as his instrument to uncommon and unforgettable effect.'



Palm Wine Tapper and The Boy at Jericho is Nithy Kasa's debut collection of poetry. It is the diary of a woman's journey from the nature-rich countryside and the red-sanded desert to the Lego-like city. Written in the narrative folklore genre of her native culture, it sketches the passage from a child's world, mystifying and exploratory, to the inner complexities of womanhood.

Fiona Bolger said that 'Kasa's poetry is the jazz, the jive, the joy of her life while never denying the sadness and pain of growing up far from family. Her experience is crafted into original and fresh poetry. If you'd like to see where Irish poetry could be headed this is a good place to start.'







Susannah Dickey's Common Decency is a darkly powerful novel about two lives running closely in parallel but divided by gulfs of misunderstanding. With boundless wisdom and deep empathy, Dickey charts the anonymity and hidden intimacies of modern existence, and our profound human need to connect.

Jan Carson said that 'Susannah Dickey has an uncanny ability to get right to the dark heart of her characters, blending acidic observation with a generous side of kindness. Common Decency is sharp as tacks, extremely funny and deeply moving. This novel is very good company.'



Set during the political and social unrest of the 1980s, as families struggled to survive and their children struggled to be free, Karl Geary's Juno Loves Legs is a beautiful, vivid novel of childhood friendship; about being young, being hurt, being seen and, most of all, being loved.

Juno has loved Legs since their first encounter at school in Dublin, where she fought the playground bullies for him. He feels brave with her, she feels safe with him, and together they feel invincible, even if the world has other ideas.

Douglas Stuart, author of Shuggie Bain, said 'Juno Loves Legs broke my heart. I never wanted it to end.'



BAD BRIDGET: CRIME, MAYHEM AND THE LIVES OF IRISH EMIGRANT WOMEN Thursday 1 June | 6pm | €15 Listowel Courthouse

Bad Bridget: Crime, Mayhem and the Lives of Irish Emigrant Women is a masterpiece of social history and true crime, showing us a fascinating and previously unexplored world.

Elaine Farrell and Leanne McCormick. creators of the celebrated 'Bad Bridget' podcast, have unearthed a world in which Irish women actually outnumbered Irish men in prison, in which you could get locked up for 'stubbornness', and in which a serial killer called Lizzie Halliday was described by the New York Times as 'the worst woman on earth'. They reveal the social forces that bred this mayhem and dysfunction, through stories that are brilliantly strange, sometimes funny,

and often moving. From sex workers and thieves to kidnappers and killers, these Bridgets are young women who have gone from the frying pan of their impoverished homeland to the fire of vast North American cities.

Ireland in the nineteenth and early twentieth centuries was not a good place to be a woman. Among the wave of emigrants from Ireland to North America were many young women who travelled on their own, hoping for a better life. Some lived lives of quiet industry and piety. Others quickly found themselves in trouble-bad trouble, and on an astonishing scale.

Join the authors in the historic setting of the still-working Listowel Courthouse as they discuss their captivating work of social history.

In Raised Among Vultures, Molly Twomey's spectacular debut seemingly nonchalant expressions of hard experience meld with vivid imaginings. Excited hearts are 'bumper cars', a Coke is 'a huge cup of starless sky' and a radish is 'a red grenade'.

Ciara Ní É is a bilingual poet, educator and television presenter. She is at the forefront of a renaissance of spoken word poetry in Irish and is the founder and host of REIC, a series of events that showcases new work as Gaeilge alongside writing in English and in other languages. Her work has featured across many platforms and she is a contributor to Queering the Green: post-2000 Queer Irish Poetry.

What if the sport that you play has a different name for women than it does for men, despite identical rules? And what if you don't even feel entirely comfortable in an all-female sporting environment because you're shy, bookish, not really one of the girls? In The Grass Ceiling, acclaimed novelist and camogie player Eimear Ryan digs deep into the confluence between gender and sport, and all the questions it throws up about identity, status, competition and selfexpression. At a time when women's sport is on the rise but still a long way from equality, it is a sharp, nuanced and heartfelt exploration of questions that effect every girl-and boy-in sport.



When Rebecca Perry was growing up, she competed nationally and internationally as a trampolinist. This immersive and compelling book deftly blends memoir and lyrical nonfiction to explore a time she 'chose air over earth' and intensive schedules of practice. From the aerial views of English sports halls and international stadiums, to the texture of a fingernail pressed against silver beads on a leotard, Perry's explorations are immersive, sensuous, funny, traumatic and tender. In On Trampolining, Perry weaves arresting tales on pain, expectation, flight and grief in relation to competitive sport, memory and the body.

The conversation will be led by Emma Larkin, author of the Izzy series of sportsthemed books for children. It will be introduced by Aisling Darby, a champion junior gymnast who did her work placement with Writers' Week in January.



Elaine Feeney's How to Build a Boat is about 13-year-old Jamie O'Neill, whose two biggest ambitions are to build a Perpetual Motion Machine and to connect with his mum, Noelle, who died when he was born. With vivid imagery and beautiful prose, Elaine Feeney tells the story of how Jamie's mission transforms the lives of those in his community.



Tell Me What I Am by Una Mannion is about the aftermath of Deena Garvey's disappearance in 2004 and the effect it leaves on her sister and daughter: her daughter grows up in the country while her sister stays stuck in the city. Una Mannion tells the tale of these two women, four hundred miles apart, slowly unearthing the secrets and lies at the heart of their family.



Service by Sarah Gilmartin circles three different stories: the waitress, the chef and the chef's wife. But which one contains the truth? The story of truth coming to light after many years, the elegance of the food, the wild parties after service, and the sizzling tension of the kitchens. This is a novel about the facades that we maintain, the lies that we tell and the courage it takes to face the truth.






Join Una Mannion for a conversation with Tess Gunty, winner of the US National Book Award for Fiction in 2022 and author of The Rabbit Hutch, and Jean Hanff Korelitz, author of eight novels, most recently The Latecomer.

The Rabbit Hutch is a bitingly funny, razorsharp debut from Tess Gunty about a motley assortment of residents (an online obituary writer; a young mother with a secret; a woman waging a solo campaign against rodents) in a crumbling apartment block. Separated by the thin walls of The Rabbit Hutch, a low-cost housing complex in the run-down Indiana town of Vacca Vale, these individual lives unfold.

PAUL MULDOON & NICK LAIRD: A POETRY READING

Paul Muldoon was recently appointed as Professor of Poetry for Ireland. He is the author of more than a dozen collections of poetry. His accolades include a Pulitzer Prize, the T. S Eliot Prize, and he has been the Oxford Professor of Poetry. The New York Times said that he is 'one of the great poets of the past hundred years, who can be everything in his poems—word-playful, lyrical, hilarious, melancholy. And angry. Only Yeats before him could write with such measured fury.'

A recent film, *Laoithe's Liricí*, about his life and work, and featured contributions from Stephen Rea, Paul Simon, PJ Harvey, Liam Neeson and many others.



Nick Laird was born in County Tyrone in 1975. A poet, novelist, screenwriter, critic and former lawyer, his awards include the Betty Trask Prize, the Rooney Prize for Irish Literature, the Geoffrey Faber Memorial Prize, the Somerset Maugham Award and a Guggenheim fellowship. For many years he taught at American universities including Columbia, Princeton and NYU and he is currently the Seamus Heaney Professor of Poetry at Queen's

University, Belfast. His books include *To A Fault* and *On Purpose*. His last collection, Feel Free, was shortlisted for the TS Eliot and the Derek Walcott prizes. His poem, 'Up Late', was awarded the Forward Prize for Best Single Poem in 2022, and a new collection is forthcoming in June 2023.

His new book, *Up Late*, is published the day before this event at Writers' Week.





Michael Crawley is a writer and international long distance runner who spent time researching elite professional long distance running in Ethiopia. The resulting book, *Out of Thin Air: Running Wisdom and Magic from Above the Clouds*

in Ethiopia, tells the story of his time there. The book is as much about male friendship in the face of adversity as it is about professional sport.

Arguably the greatest distance runner of all time, Haile Gebrselassie, said 'through reading this book you will come to understand that the heart and soul of running are to be found in Ethiopia.'



ELSEWHERE: YAN GE IN CONVERSATION WITH LUCY CALDWELL



In her highly anticipated English-language debut, Yan Ge explores isolation in nine iridescent, witty and wondrous tales. Both contemporary and ancient, real and surreal, the stories in *Elsewhere* range from China to Dublin to London and Stockholm.

From a group of writers lounging on the edge of a disaster zone to a mandarin ostracised from his old court trying to avoid assassination, these are strange and beguiling stories of dispossession, longing and the diasporic experience.

Yan Ge will be in conversation with Lucy Calwell, author of *These Days*, who described *Elsewhere* as 'precise, surreal and emotionally devastating.'





Threads is a fascinating history of Irishmen, woven through the clothes they wear.

Taking the clothes they wore as a starting point, Paul Galvin skilfully weaves together a collection of stories of Irish men who defined the culture and mood of their time.

In 'Push' he tells the story of the legendary Walker Brothers—cyclists and soldiers who pedalled through a storm for Ireland at the 1912 Stockholm Games.

In 'Born Mad', discover another side to Samuel Beckett—sartor and prolific sportsman who had knockout power as a champion boxer in school. In 'Boland' we learn about Harry Boland's background as a trained tailor, and in 'Jack' we encounter Jack B. Yeats at the Olympic Games in Paris.

These are just some of men who have inspired Paul's own fashion collections and whom he writes about here in a fascinating collection that shines a light on how history is woven into the clothes Irishmen wear.

Paul Galvin is among the all-time greatest Gaelic football players. As a stalwart of the Kerry inter-county team from 2003 until his retirement in 2014, he won four All-Ireland titles. A qualified teacher, at 30 years old he sought a new challenge as a clothing designer. He has rewritten the language of men's fashion, creating 15 men's collections to date with Dunnes Stores.





Louise Kennedy, author of the acclaimed *Trespasses* and *The End of the World is a Cul de Sac*, will lead a conversation with two emerging stars of Irish writing: Megan Nolan, author of *Acts of Desperation*, and Michael Magee, author of *Close to Home*.

Trespasses by Louise Kennedy was the most-recommended book of 2022 by newspaper critics in Ireland and the UK.

Megan Nolan has been a recipient of a Betty Trask Award and shortlisted for the Sunday Times Young Writer of the Year Award.

Michael Magee was named as one of The Observer's Best New Novelists for 2023.


